## National Night Out

Crank out the hot dish, fire up the grill, but leave the dessert to us!

On National Night Out (NNO), Tuesday, August 1, KFNA will be sending a bike brigade through the streets of Kingfield, scooping Sebastian Joe's for all registered NNO street parties! Be sure to register your party with the City by July 11; there is no registration fee, and it assures that your party will be counted in the national event and eligible for door prizes, and that KFNA volunteers will stop by with the cream! Please register your party even if you do not want your street barricaded for the night. If you do want your street blocked off, please note the following changes in the street closure process:

- People who want to close their

streets will be encouraged to use the City's web site whenever possible. Those who don't have web access will be directed to 311.

- Bus routes, county highways, state highways and arterial routes cannot be closed for National Night Out, by the terms of the ordinance. There will be no exceptions.

- SAFE Central staff will be processing all requests for NNO street closure. Public Works is no longer involved.

- SAFE Central will send street closure packets (tape, signs, permits) to those who have been approved for street closure. People will no longer have to pick up tape and signs at fire stations or police precincts.

- Permits to close your street will be issued FREE until July 18! From July 19-27, applications will be accepted, but the permit will cost \$100. No applications will be accepted after July 27...and you'll miss the ice cream, too!

## Nicollet-East Harriet Business Association News

## Building community, Block by block

*Editor's note: While most people think community activities are a great idea, some are stumped on ways to bring their own block together. For the next several issues, we will spotlight activities that have worked for different blocks in the neighborhood. If your block has a community-building tradition, let us know about it! We'd love to include it in a future issue of the Kingfield News.*

Winter and work can be tough on community. Jobs, school, meetings and extracurricular activities keep everyone away from the house - and from their neighbors. For the past ten years, residents on the 4100 block of Blaisdell Avenue have been bringing their community back together with a great end-of-the-week solution: summertime Friday happy hours.

These gatherings began when JoAnn Lee, a resident on the block for the past 20 years, got the idea from a friend at work. As she listened to her friend describe an informal driveway happy hour she had attended in Eagan, JoAnn realized that hosting a similar event would be a great way to bring her neighbors together. She ran off some flyers inviting people on the block to show up the next Friday at 5 p.m., BYOB and an appetizer, and a tradition was born.

The idea is simple. Hosts rotate throughout the block. A resident who wants to play host will drag a bunch of lawn chairs into their driveway or front lawn on Friday afternoon, and neighbors who want to participate will mosey over after work, with an appetizer to share and a favorite beverage. Some get-togethers are over by 7, while others last well past sundown.

The frequency of the events has varied over the years, and seems to be related to whether neighbors remember to keep the evening low-key. At times, block residents have gone overboard with fancy hors d'oeuvres, setting the bar intimidatingly high for the next gathering. Other times, folks have gathered at 5 and hung around until close to midnight, munching chips, quaffing beer, and shooting the breeze. JoAnn's advice: make sure you don't go overboard. The simpler the gathering, the easier for everyone.

## NRP Phase II Plan approved by you!

The KFNA Board and its NRP (Neighborhood Revitalization Program) Steering Committee presented the Phase II Plan to neighbors in attendance at the KFNA Annual meeting on April 17th. The plan allocates \$770,000 to projects and programs in the neighborhood over the next 5 years, and keeps KFNA operating to initiate and oversee these projects. The City requires that 70% of the funds be spent on housing or housing-related activities. The remainder of the funds are directed toward environmental, crime prevention, and community building projects.

The plan was unanimously approved by the 70+ KFNA members in attendance at the meeting. Upon approval by the NRP Policy Board and the Minneapolis City Council, KFNA will begin implementation of the projects specified for 2006. ## Nicollet Lighting on the way

Street lamps along Nicollet Avenue from 36th to 40th Street will be installed by City of Minneapolis crews in June. The project will be accomplished within a few weeks by using directional boring, and will not involve any driving restrictions or street closings. Occasional limited parking restrictions may apply.

Over 70% of this project is supported by KFNA NRP funds; the remainder is covered by an additional assessment that Nicollet property owners agreed to take on. Thank you, Nicollet property owners, for your support of this project, which will improve the atmosphere and safety of the corridor!

## Note From the President

On a dark and stormy night in early May, we held our board training as rain drummed over our heads. This "training" was purely a ploy to meet new and returning board members, eat the best fried chicken in town from Nardie's, and brainstorm with black magic marker: How can we make Kingfield even better?

Niki Valens, owner of Victor's 1959 Café, hosted the gathering on her covered back porch. Several other reelected board members joined us. Among them: Ben Kristensen, who brought burgers and beer, and said, of his four years as KFNA's Treasurer, "It's been great." Darrell Gerber rushed in from class at the Humphrey Institute, where he's all-but-biomass-thesis, and said, "Lignocellulosic production is great." JobyLynn likes words more evocative than "great." She recently considered a new last name, Sassily Dazzle Adhesive, but wisely shortened it to Sassily. And Arthur Knowles, KFNA's institutional memory, was back, after spending his term-limited year off the board painting a few more houses than usual.

New members attended as well. Kathy McGilvray, director of disability services and a teacher at Bethel College, just moved to the neighborhood from a few blocks north, her tandem bike in tow. Tom Perent is an architect, greening his garage roof this summer. Other new board members: Ryan Raleigh, who works at HUD, bringing a background in urban planning and housing (his wife, Kathy, coordinates the Farmers' Market); Shawna Gibson, a realtor trained in urban studies, who fixed up the house now surrounded by birdhouse fence posts; Ann Bechler-Ingwalson, who works with adolescents in behavioral health services at the U of MN Medical Center, and plans work on a neuropsychology PhD in the fall; and Ed Rachy, who works for Northwest Airlines and essentially lives atop Shortie and Wags' place.

Amid thunderclaps, we tossed around ideas for Kingfield. We wanted to build on KFNA's annual meeting, where we learned about current projects-housing, pedestrian bridge redevelopment, community building

through the arts, market, and anti-crime walking groups, green projects like tree replanting and storm water management - and about KFNA's plans for its \$770,000 allocation from NRP Phase II. Some of us pitched new events: Summer movie and music nights? A Kingfield fun run/walk? Some aimed to improve existing events: an ice-cream brigade at National Night Out? Expand Second Sundays at the Farmers' Market? And we hit hard issues like crime, homelessness, and transportation.

## Down With Hazardous Waste!

Open a cupboard in your kitchen, basement, or garage. Read a few product labels. If they contain any of these words - CAUTION, WARNING, DANGER, POISON - those products may contain hazardous materials. Hazardous to you, hazardous to your family and hazardous to our environment if not disposed of properly.

Hennepin County will be sponsoring various neighborhood hazardous waste collection events in the City of Minneapolis this summer, planned in cooperation with the City of Minneapolis and Minneapolis Neighborhood Associations. The neighborhood collection events are being offered to encourage residents to safely and properly dispose of their unwanted garden and household hazardous waste.

The county will accept many household hazardous wastes, including items containing mercury (fluorescent and HID lamps, thermostats and thermometers); pesticides; automotive wastes (fuel additives, starter fluid, waxes); aerosol cans, paint, lead-based paint chips, solvents and thinners; pool, photographic and hobby

chemicals; and household batteries. Call 348-3777 with questions on accepted materials or go to [www.hennepin.us](http://www.hennepin.us) keyword search: Mpls HHW events. The department emphasizes that business-generated wastes will not be accepted at the collection sites.

**BONUS:** A free compact fluorescent light bulb will be given to each of the first 100 households that bring waste to the Household Hazardous Waste Drop-Off on June 24, courtesy of the Kingfield Neighborhood Association.

This collection provides residents with a convenient neighborhood location to dispose of their problem wastes. As a year-round alternative to these collections, Hennepin County provides residents with two drop-off facilities, located at 8100 Jefferson Highway, Brooklyn Park; and 1400 W. 96th St., Bloomington. Call the County's 24-Hour Info Line at 612-348-6500 for the hours of operation and materials accepted at these facilities.

## A Smooth Transition at Butter

At a number of local cafes, Kingfield residents can wake up and smell coffee provided to them by their very own neighbors. In January, Dan Swenson-Klatt joined the growing ranks of Kingfield coffee shop owners by purchasing Butter, located at 3544 Grand Avenue.

Dan had dreamed of owning a coffee shop for several years, based on his love of hosting gatherings and a desire to "put food out for folks." With three siblings involved in various aspects of the coffee business, coffee shop talk was common at family gatherings. Dan and his family moved to the 4000 block of Blaisdell two years ago and were inspired by the large number of independently-owned cafes in the area. Then, Butter came up for sale last fall, and Dan decided to take the plunge, becoming a small business owner after twenty years as a middle-school teacher. The sibling expertise has come in handy - Dan's brother now works at the shop, and his sisters stand by with professional advice.

So far, changes have been small but meaningful. Along with coffee drinks and sweets, Butter still offers lunch and light dinner items and brunch on weekends. Dan has been gradually changing and adding recipes, bringing in healthier sweets and hoping to start baking and selling breads, pies and cakes as he becomes accustomed to the equipment and ovens that came with the shop. After a long tradition of creating amazing homemade ice cream and gelato for his neighbors every 4th of July, Dan is working on the logistics of bringing a selection of these treats into the shop this summer.

The ambiance at Butter is also

changing, as rigid seating areas have been replaced with smaller, more mobile tables and chairs to encourage gatherings. Study groups, a book club, and business groups meet regularly at Butter, and Dan hopes that the long counter overlooking Butter's work space will become another convivial spot for patrons to hang out.

As the weather turns nice for walks, keep Butter - and its potential for gelato - in mind!

## Minneapolis Meditation Group

112 W. 43rd Street is the new home of the Minneapolis Meditation Group of Self-Realization Fellowship. While the 43rd Street address is new, the group has a history dating back to 1927. At that time a spiritual teacher named Swami Yoganda was lecturing in the region. Following his visit, a group of about 600 students decided to begin meeting regularly to celebrate his teachings.

Swami Yoganda taught extensively in the 1920's and 30's, inspiring a

movement that would eventually become known as the Self-Realization Fellowship (SFR). Followers see the work of Swami Yoganda as universal teachings that illuminate the ancient science of Yoga. Today SFR has centers and meditation groups throughout the world. Their ongoing mission is to foster greater harmony and understanding among those of all races, religions, and nationalities.

Swami Yoganda was from India, and thus, many aspects of his teachings are steeped in the rich tradition of Hinduism and drawn from classic Indian texts such as the Bhagavad Gita. However, SFR embraces and celebrates many elements of the New Testament as well as other spiritual texts. Indeed, many of the structures that one would associate with a Christian church can be found at the Minneapolis Meditation Group. There is a weekly Sunday morning worship service that includes meditation time, chanting, teaching and fellowship. There is Sunday School for kids, and a vegetarian potluck held on the first Sunday of every month.

As the name implies, meditation is the heart of the spiritual discipline that the group embraces. The particular style practiced and promoted by the Minneapolis Meditation Group is called Kriya Yoga. Practitioners claim that it is a highly effective system of yoga meditation whose goal is direct, personal experience of God.

In addition to the Sunday morning service, the Minneapolis Meditation Group offers a variety of tailored experiences such as a Reading Service, an Inspiration Service, a Meditation Service, and so forth.
