Mural Crawl Draws Enthusiastic Crowd

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Remember the glorious fall that we had this year? Sunday, October 2, the day of the Kingfield Mural Crawl, was no exception. This outdoor event featured two party sites and fourteen Kingfield murals, and drew close to 100 neighbors out of their homes to enjoy fine weather, even finer local art, and the finest of all neighborhoods!

Some participants did "crawl" from site to site, a walk that took almost the full two hours. Many more of them biked, which allowed folks additional time to enjoy the sounds of The Roe Family Singers and Victor Yepez at the party sites, made possible by donations from Colonial Cleaners, Spectrum Travel, Peterson Flowers, and The Groomsmen.

Party sites were also well stocked with root beer floats, cookies, caramel rolls, banana bread and other treats donated by Anodyne, Curran's, Fairy Godmother, Never Enough Thyme, Sebastian Joe's, and The Roastery, a local Kingfield Farmers' Market business. ABC... Art is the Key

One of KFNA's primary goals is to build connections in the neighborhood, both between KFNA and neighbors and between neighbors. The new Art Builds Community (ABC) project was born out of a tongue-in-cheek comment made in early 2005 by a KFNA Board Member and local artist, Mari O'Rourke, who said that KFNA was not getting community participation at board meetings because the meetings were "no fun." This brutally honest comment inspired two reactions. First, the board looked anew at events and meetings with an eye toward instilling a sense of fun, in an attempt to attract new neighbors while retaining faithful attendees. Secondly, the board considered a completely new project that would center around a sense of playfulness, thus boosting KFNA's staid image. This challenge was met by organizing a community art project, the Kingfield Art Chair. Twelve Kingfield artists participated in the show and virtually all of them requested that some deliberate form of community art project continue in Kingfield.

Presenting Kingfield's Art Builds Community (ABC) project, which will hold two events in 2006. The first, Art is the Key, will be held in March. Kingfield artists and community members will be given a literal key as a common element that they will incorporate into the creation of threedimensional art. Community Building Days (see related story) at Leonardo's will focus on the key also, and neighbors will have access to other free building materials and tools to create their artwork, as well as support from local artists as they build their creations. Neighborhood kids are encouraged to participate in creating works of art, and their artwork will be displayed at a showing called Youth are Key.

The Art is the Key show will run from March 13th through March 25th. A closing party and silent auction will will be held Saturday evening, March 25th at Anodyne, which will be closed to regular business for the evening. This fundraiser and silent auction will feature artful food and desserts prepared by Scott Pampuch, chef and owner of the Corner Table, as well as wine and beer from his favorite vineyards and breweries. All artists paying the \$20 entry fee and submitting artwork to this event will receive two free tickets. The general public can purchase advance tickets for \$10 20 per person in January, \$20 per person in February, \$25 per person in March, or \$30 at the door.

The Youth are Key show and an Art is the Key show will be held separately at Anodyne during March. The Youth show will run from March 6 until close on Sunday, March 12, when it will close with a celebration and silent auction of the artwork. The fee to enter art will be \$10 per piece and the artist will receive two free adult tickets to the Art is the Key show. The second event, *Opening Doors*, will occur in late summer and will be a truly public art show where interested groups of neighbors organized by block will receive an actual door, and together will turn it into a work of art. The "doors will be opened" in Kingfield on a particular night and neighbors will be encouraged to "crawl" around the neighborhood to see the art that their neighbors have created.

Note From the President

Living near 37th and Pillsbury, I often commute past the Werness Brothers Funeral Home at 37th and Nicollet. I've rarely thought much about the stucco and timber building, circa 1940-that is, until a for-sale sign popped up in the front yard.

I wondered immediately: Who would buy an old funeral parlor?

Another mortuary might be a logical purchaser-there's a built-in rope-andpulley casket elevator-but I learned from the listing agent that direct competitors are out of the running.

Which prompted a second, more interesting question: What is the highest and best re-use of an old funeral parlor?

A dental practice might have similar karma--you never like going, but you almost always feel better afterwards. A German restauranteur might enjoy the building's Bavarian feel. A school or day care might like the eclectic blend of large and small spaces. A fledgling church or theatre company might be drawn to the 40-pew chapel, with its stained glass windows and electric organ.

Or perhaps the property's value rests not in the building but in the landalmost an acre on a major commercial corridor with immediate access to transit options and the interstate. With underground parking, the parcel could be home to a thoughtful mixeduse development: ground-floor retail below a combination of market-rate and affordable housing units.

Such a model is clearly viable in Kingfield. Just one block south of the funeral home, at 38th and Nicollet, the Lander Group is redeveloping the Theisen Vending building, with streetlevel commercial space in the historic structure surrounded and capped by 40 condominium units. KFNA has partnered with Lander to ensure that about 20% of the condos in "38" are long-term affordable units. One block north of the funeral home, at 36th and Nicollet, KFNA has pressed the city to explore acquisition and re-sale of the chain-linked corner parcel through its Higher Density Corridor Housing Initiative, a program in which the city pays fair market value for properties, then resells at a reduced fair re-use

value to developers who commit to building housing units, at least 20% which of are affordable.

We envision a Nicollet Avenue renaissance through these and

Erik Lindseth other redevelopment opportunities. You have helped shaped this vision, most recently through a community brainstorming session in September to guide our use of the second phase of NRP funding, most of which must be applied toward housing-related initiatives. We have heard your call to be smart with our money--to leverage our funds for green, affordable, and varied housing through recoverable grants and loans to residents, nonprofits, and developers who meet KFNA's redevelopment and affordable housing goals.

So if you see new life for an old funeral home, you know that our door is open.

Corridor Housing Initiative Receives Award

(MnAPA) honored the Center for Neighborhoods' Corridor Housing Initiative on September 20th with an "Outstanding Planning Award." This award for a "Special Community Initiative" recognizes the partnerships formed among neighborhoods, developers and local governments to strengthen the historic corridors of Minneapolis.

The Minnesota Chapter of the 46th Street. Neighborhood volunteers American Planning Association worked diligently to understand both historic and existing strengths of this area, as well as the goals and needs of Kingfield residents. One outcome of this effort is the "Kingfield Neighborhood Design & Development Guidelines," adopted by the KFNA Board on November 10, 2004.

Voters went to the polls in Minneapolis on November 8 to elect their city's leaders. In the newlyredistricted Eighth Ward, which now includes over 60% of Kingfield, Elizabeth Glidden was elected to an open seat (current Eighth Ward council-member Robert Lilligren will represent the redistricted 10th Ward, while current 10th Ward councilmember Dan Niziolek is stepping down at the end of his term). Kingfield residents may not be aware that Glidden lives in the heart of Kingfield, on the 4000 block of Blaisdell Avenue, and has been a Kingfield resident since moving back to Minnesota in 1994 after law school and a clerkship in Iowa. Like many, she was first drawn to this area by its proximity to the lakes and shops, and has been thrilled with the ever-increasing number and success of walking-distance, customerfriendly establishments at the business nodes along Grand and Nicollet Avenues.

Glidden spoke to large numbers of Kingfield residents during her city council campaign, and took note that Kingfield residents are united in many of their concerns and hopes for the neighborhood and the city as a whole. When asked what top three recurring issues she heard mentioned. Glidden listed transportation. city management/fiscal responsibility, and safety concerns. She was struck by how informed and active Kingfield residents are, particularly citing the neighborhood's interest and participation in long-term transportation planning issues such as the 35W Access Project and the possibility of dedicated transit lanes in the expansion of 35W.

revitalization of 38th and Chicago Avenue, the Lander project at 38th and Nicollet, and East Lake Street; transportation issues such as implementation of a bus-rapid transit lane on 35W and noise abatement in areas near the airport; and communication issues. At the neighborhood level, Glidden is particularly interested in the possibility of a new Kingfield Business Association, which she believes would give Kingfield businesses more clout in their dealings with the city. On a larger scale, Glidden mentioned her desire to stay connected to neighborhood concerns through listening sessions or town hall forums, and also noted the city's 311 initiative (see sidebar).

Glidden relishes the challenge of serving on the Minneapolis City Council, and is excited about the opportunity to represent the Eighth Ward, and her own neighborhood, at the city level.

The Corridor Housing Initiative included five urban corridors, each selected through a competitive process by the Center for Neighborhoods. These sites were Nicollet Avenue near Loring Park, Lake Street, Nicollet Avenue in Kingfield, South Lyndale Avenue, and West Broadway.

The Kingfield Neighborhood's involvement with the Corridor Housing Initiative focused on the area of Nicollet Avenue from 36th Street to

The 311 Call Center is a new nonemergency phone number for information and services provided by the City of Minneapolis. The Call Center itself is housed at the 3rd Precinct police station. With 311, the City will now have a single "point of contact" for residents to call with questions, service requests, and issues, including many, such as graffiti reporting, that have previously been handled by 911. King Bridge Partnership-Bridge Design Survey Results

A working group from the Bryant and Kingfield neighborhoods was formed to advocate for the rebuilding of the pedestrian and bicycle bridge across I-35 near the Martin Luther King Park. This bridge provides important access for those in the Bryant neighborhood to this important facility in Kingfield and is a key link in the proposed Riverlake Greenway. However, the current bridge has a number of problems—sight lines are poor, access and egress is dangerous, it is narrow, and it is unattractive when seen from the freeway.

The working group has been successfully raising money for the bridge and would like to hold an international design competition. It needed information on local design preferences both for fund raising and for background to the competition. The group asked the Design Center to create materials for the Kingfield Festival in conjunction with a youth model building exercise designed by others. The design team created an informational board illustrating a wide variety of attractive pedestrian/bike bridge styles from around the world, a visual preference survey of key components of bridges, and a simple sheet with space for drawing, collage, or writing.

Richard Dreher, the previous owner of the Chicago Avenue location, is still a partner in the educational part of the business, while Mike and Bonni own the retail end.

If you wonder how a scuba shop can make a go of it in the middle of the continent, think "land of 10,000 lakes" - including a couple of really big lakes. Naturally, there are local divers who head for saltwater at every opportunity. However, there are many whose passion is to investigate shipwrecks in Lake Superior, go cave diving in Wisconsin, or plunge into the Crosby Mine pits.

For every diving environment there is a specific type of equipment, gas mix and technique. As for the technique, Mike and Richard offer ongoing instruction. They conduct classes at the store and use local swimming facilities in order to teach applied diving techniques and help participants achieve a variety of certification levels for various types of diving. Leonardo's "New" Basement

"Leonardo's Basement began with an after-school gang of Barton Open School kids who wanted to do more science." according to founder Steve Jevning. Over the past six years it has grown into an organization that harnesses the creative talents of over 30 instructors. This past summer more than 350 kids attended classes and workshops on subjects ranging from gokart building to the construction of "bicycle puppets." Leonardo's Basement offers a dazzling array of courses and activities. but at their core they all strive to unleash the vast creative potential of kids.

This past spring Leonardo's Basement moved into the bottom level of 4301 Nicollet Avenue South. This location is best known for its first floor tenants, Anodyne Coffee House and Sebastian Joe's Ice Cream. Previously occupied by a church, the 4,800 sq. foot basement space underwent considerable renovation in order to accommodate the buzz of creative activity that Leonardo's Basement

generates. Two large dumpsters were filled with the remnants of gutted offices and hallways, all demolished to make way for spacious workshop areas, computer labs and racks of storage shelving containing every conceivable surplus material.

The exterior of Leonardo's new space has undergone its own transformation with the help of local artists Kristin Abhalter and Joanne Jongsma. Funded through KFNA, the artists worked side by side with area teens to create a swirling mural suggestive of the energy that circulates inside the building. Abhalter and Jongsma are currently in the process of creating art installations, which will hang on the wall of the building.

KFNA has also partnered with Leonardo's Basement on a series of events called "Community Building Days." (See related article on page 1.) Scheduled every second Sunday from 1-4 PM at their 4301 Nicollet location, the schedule of events is built around a variety of themes such as recycling, water art and neighborhood beautification. This is a great hands-on opportunity for families to become acquainted with Leonardo's Basement, and it is free!

Leonardo's ongoing schedule of workshops and classes is continually growing. Thanks to a pair of technology grants, teens will soon have the opportunity to study computerbased animation.
