Crime and Safety in Kingfield

Lately, wherever I am in Kingfield, neighbors stop me and ask, "What's with all this crime?" It is true that the types and numbers of crimes in the neighborhood have increased. Perhaps even more dramatically, people's perception of their safety has declined.

Kingfield Neighborhood Association is concerned about the increase in crime and has taken the following steps to address safety issues:

1) KFNA has partnered with the Police Department and formed a Crime and Safety Task Force that meets the second Wednesday of each month from 7-8 p.m. at MLK Park to review crime reports and listen to resident concerns.

2) On February 8, KFNA held a community meeting and Q&A organized by Minneapolis Police and Council Members regarding the homicide committed 1/23/06. Inspector Arneson, Lt. Piontek, Sector Lt. Przynski, CPS Tom Thompson, and Lt. Lee Edwards of Homicide addressed residents' concerns.

3) KFNA has organized a citizen patrol walking group that meets at MLK Park at 7 p.m. on Tuesday nights to walk the neighborhood and keep citizen eyes on the street, and let criminals know that we are watching their actions.

4) KFNA is recruiting new block leaders and connecting them to

CCP/Safe block leader training.

5) KFNA posts all Kingfield-specific crime alerts on the Kingfield E-mail

So what can you do to feel safe, and be safe, in your community? The basics: 1) Most important, get to know your neighbors! 2) Pay attention to people or activities that don't "belong" on your street. 3) Call 911 to report suspicious activity and criminal activity. 4) Stay informed. Sign up to receive KFNA email notices and CCP/Safe neighborhood crime reports.

Reaching Out

KFNA offers many ways for neighbors to connect, like the boulevard tree-planting project this spring, the Opening Doors Block-by-Block art show this fall, or a specific Kingfield Community Initiated Grant targeted to your block. KFNA can help you plan projects to facilitate community-building on your block, connect you to block leader training and assist in developing a neighbor-to-neighbor contact list, so you can be sure to be in contact with all your neighbors when important issues arise.

On a larger scale, KFNA offers opportunities for you to meet people from the entire neighborhood. The Art is the Key Art Show and Silent Auction, March 25, will be a chance to see your neighbors as artists, and spend a social night supporting their work and KFNA. The Kingfield Annual Meeting, April 17, will bring neighbors together to review and vote on the Phase II NRP Plan and elect KFNA's volunteer board, which guides the work of your neighborhood association. Community Build Days happen every second Sunday of the month, 1-4 PM, at Leonardo's Basement, below Anodyne at 4301 Nicollet. Kingfield Walkers meet every Tuesday from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. at MLK Park to walk the Northeast section of Kingfield. Volunteers who serve on the various committees and planning groups (such as NRP, Redevelopment, Green, Newsletter, King Bridge Partnership, Farmers' Market, Art) are the backbone of the neighborhood.

KFNA encourages you to participate in Kingfield on a block- and neighborhood-wide level. The connections you make are what will make your neighborhood safer and create a stronger community. If you don't know how to get involved, call me. I would love to help you find a place where you can be involved.

Petersen Flowers Rises from the Ashes

Early on the morning of Wednesday, February 8, firefighters responded to a fire at Petersen Flowers near the intersection of Lyndale Ave. S. and 38th St. The building was a total loss and investigators suspected arson. It was later confirmed that a burglar had removed a store safe and started the fire before leaving the scene.

By Wednesday afternoon the front façade of the charred business was covered with handwritten cards wishing the owners well and expressing regret and outrage over the incident. This was the first sign that this senseless act would soon be overshadowed by a neighborhood's devotion to one of its favorite retailers.

The story of the incident spread quickly as this was only days away from what is usually a flower shop's biggest sales period - Valentines Day. Several television news crews, complete with satellite trucks, descended upon the corner. Meanwhile, owners Glen and Jane Luedtke, with the help of daughter Vicki Schmidt, prepared to sell their newly arrived shipments of flowers out of their refrigerated truck. A makeshift sales counter was assembled underneath a protective canopy in the small parking lot next to the store.

To the great relief of the entire neighborhood, the arsonist was apprehended within days of the incident. The suspect, Vaughn James Yaints, 47, is a "career burglar" who

has spent much of the last three decades behind bars. Yaints was apprehended in response to another burglary he committed on the day following the arson. He subsequently led police to the store safe, which had been looted and abandoned near the site of the fire.

Ironically, the ill-timed loss of their building resulted in a brisk flow of business for the Luedtkes. Newspaper articles, radio interviews, live television feeds and internet blogging all funneled sympathetic customers to the makeshift store. In addition, the business was adequately insured and the owners have expressed a desire to rebuild. At this time it is unclear whether or not current zoning regulations will allow the owners to

rebuild on the current site.

The Luedtkes have been overwhelmed and impressed by the outpouring of support from the entire neighborhood. It may well be that Petersen Flowers returns better than ever. Regardless, neighborhood and business have forged a permanent bond, tempered by fire and ash.

Note From the President

Here's how it works:

You skip The Apprentice on Monday night, April 17. You head over to MLK Park at 5:30 for potluck, or by 7:00 p.m. to eat a cookie, drink some punch, greet your neighbors. You stand up, say a few words about yourself, what you think about Kingfield, what you think we could do better. Your neighbors listen. Then everybody writes down some names on a scrap of paper, and there we have it--a board of directors and alternates to guide our non-profit neighborhood association.

Now, here's why you should do it:

1. We need you. Every year, half of our 13-member board turns over. Some directors run again, some bow out. At least three alternates are needed, most of whom later become directors when board members step down for various reasons. No matter your vocation or avocations, we can use your input, particularly if you have experience in fundraising, grant writing, marketing, architecture, or technology, including web site maintenance and design.

2. It's not that much time. Believe me, I know: You've got kids, you're in school, you work hard, you're tired at night, you like The Apprentice. But, in the grand scheme of things, it's not much time. Most board members spend perhaps six hours a month, divided between a committee meeting where the work gets done and a board meeting where the votes get taken. Our excellent paid part-time staff members do the lion's share of the front-line work.

3. We're fairly efficient. I know that grass-roots community action can be messy-people like tangents, meetings run long, good folks burn out. But we do our best to run a tight ship: our committees lay the groundwork and make recommendations to the board on nearly all ideas we take up-from drier budget issues to sexier redevelopment, environmental or programmatic issues. Even if you don't have time for the board (see point 2), you can make a major impact by serving on a committee; in fact, a fair number of former board members do just that.

4. It's your neighborhood. You probably already volunteer precious time, perhaps through an organization with a mission or issue of importance in your life. But KFNA offers what many others cannotlocation, location, location. While I am also moved to



take action on certain issues, I spend most of my volunteer time on Kingfield because our physical and relational surroundings matter so much to our daily happiness. It is hard to beat the feeling of seeing new housing built, a new business opened, a fledging event grow, a block partying, a mural painted-and knowing you played a role in helping your neighborhood become an even better place for you and your neighbors to live.

5. It can be kind of fun, too.

Bring in the Green

This spring, 319 boulevard trees will be planted in Kingfield neighborhood. This mass planting results from a partnership between the DNR, the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board and KFNA. KFNA applied for DNR ReLeaf funding in 2005 in an attempt to reforest the neighborhood after two devastating years of Dutch Elm disease. The DNR responded with a \$10,000 grant for trees, accompanied by education for their care. The Park Board agreed to plant all the trees, and also to honor all citizen requests coming from Kingfield; over 70 Kingfield neighbors called in last summer asking for a new boulevard tree. KFNA will be working with both organizations to teach neighbors about tree care.

So keep your eyes open for the Park

Building Community, block by block

Editor's note: While most people think community activities are a great the month sends out an e-mail idea, some are stumped on ways to bring their own block together. For the next several issues, we will spotlight activities that have worked for different blocks in the neighborhood. If your block has a community-building tradition, let us know about it! We'd love to include it in a later issue of the Kingfield News.

"Do you think we'd get a good price if we banded together and treated our elm trees at the same time?" "How is your new job going?" "Did you see the sculpture Tom made at Leonardo's Basement?" "I'll be in Florida all of February and part of March."

This is typical chatter at the monthly coffees on the 4100 block of Wentworth Avenue. We meet at 9:00am on the third Saturday, just for an hour, so it is not a daunting time commitment. We rotate through volunteer hosts who provide coffee and a treat, but we keep this part low key; many people arrive with their own

coffee cup in hand. The host family for reminder and the next host is determined at the end of the montl get together.

Our block does the typical annual block party and National Night Out, but we felt we needed more regular contact, especially over the winter months, so we initiated this monthly get together. The regular contact encourages people to bring up new ideas. Suggestions build on one another. So far we have created a welcome letter for people new to the block - a rather rare occurrence, but we have used it once already and the new family liked receiving the block map. From this we decided to create a neighborhood help network; this is nothing formal but we wanted everyone to know they could call on neighbors for help if they were sick and needed the snow shoveled, etc. We hope this creates an atmosphere in which people know it is ok to ask for We are in the midst of determining if we will have enough

people to get a discount on treating elms. And we are developing a list of recommended house repair providers based on peoples' experiences.

These are all simple things, and not time-consuming, but they help create the feeling of neighborliness. And we would not have them without the monthly meetings.

Not everyone participates, of course. We send out e-mail summaries of decisions people may want to know about. Periodically, the block leader distributes a printed message to the houses not on the e-mail list so everyone is kept updated and feels welcome to participate. This is an easy activity that is making a good block even better.

Kids Soccer

The winter season of Wednesday evening kids soccer sessions in the King Park gym is nearing an end. Every Wednesday from 6 to 7:15 p.m., kids from 4 to 12 and their parents, aunts, and uncles have taken over the gym at King Park for the last three winters. We will likely continue through April, as long as the weather doesn't get so nice that the kids don't want to play inside any more.

Soccer will begin again on Wednesday, June 14, with sessions every Wednesday evening and Saturday morning through Saturday, July 22nd. The outdoor sessions happen from 6 to 7:15 PM on Wednesdays, and from 10 to 11:15 on Saturdays. These occur at the baseball field #1 outfield along 42nd Street (between Nicollet and I-35W).

Cost for each season (Summer, Fall, and indoor Winter/Spring) is \$15. If your family can't afford this much, you can request a waiver. The famous bright gold King Park soccer shirts are still \$7 each.

The major effort this year will be to recruit enough 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12 year olds to create teams by the end of July to play together in the Minneapolis Park Board's fall league. The teams have to be committed and registered by the first of August. Games start in late August. The younger kids will continue Saturday sessions at King in the fall with mid-week games at Kenwood

The key to success, however, is for families from Kingfield to have their children sign up and play with the Kingfield teams. This summer will mark the fifth year of the Little Kids Soccer Program at King Park. We almost always have a good turnout for the Program. However, we continue to find that a majority of the kids in the program come from other parts of Minneapolis or the suburbs to play. Many, many kids from Kingfield play soccer with programs at other parks. We're hoping this year to change that

NRP Info (see above)

KFNA's Draft Plan for Phase II NRP Funding allocates 70% to housing-related activities, and the remainder to community building and environmental projects. These allocations are within the guidelines required by the State and the NRP Policy Board. The total plan of \$770,934 is expected to maintain KFNA for five years.

KFNA Proposed Bylaw Changes

Kingfield residents will vote on April 17 at the KFNA Annual Meeting whether to amend KFNA Bylaws to permit the board of directors to appoint directors and alternates between annual meetings upon a two-thirds vote of the board. There is currently no process to address the situation of insufficient alternates to fill vacant board seats.

The amendment would break Article 4, paragraph D (which addresses vacancies) into two separate sections. The current language addressing director vacancies would be renumbered paragraph D1, titled "Vacancies Among Directors," and

would add the following sentence as the second sentence in the paragraph: "If no alternates remain to be appointed, the Board of Directors by a two-thirds (2/3) vote may appoint a Member of the Association to serve as a Director." A new paragraph D2 would be added thereafter titled "Vacancies Among Alternates" as follows: "If at any time fewer than three (3) alternates remain from among those elected at the annual meeting as provide in Article 4, section C, the Board of Directors by a twothirds (2/3) vote may appoint a Member of the Association to serve as an alternate for the balance of the one (1) year term."
