The Kingfield Neighborhood Association's annual meeting, held on Monday, April 22nd at Martin Luther King Park, was a great success! Over 130 adults attended, along with dozens of children. The evening began at 5:30 pm with a community potluck. At 7 pm, after a brief welcome from KFNA president David Brauer, KFNA board members offered updates on the past year's board initiatives: the redevelopment of the Good Samaritan site, the attempted relocation of the now demolished Ace Hardware homes. the first Kingfield Barn-Raising, the continuing 35W ramp debate, and the new community school task force. Following project updates, 14 neighbors offered to run for the open seats on the Kingfield Board. The candidates demonstrated a widevariety of interests and skills – and all professed their love of living in Kingfield, as well as their desire to help their neighborhood. The newly elected individuals will serve on the board for two years; seven others were ranked as alternates in the case that board seats become vacant before the 2003 elections. Newly Elected Board Members

Tracine Asberry-Lindquist: A native of Detroit, Tracine loves Minneapolis as a second home. She looks forward to continuing the good work of the board on the strong foundations they have laid.

Sean Wherely: Sean lived and worked in Washington, DC for three years prior to moving to Kingfield in 2001. He works for a Minneapolisbased environmental group.

Jeanne Massey: Returning to the board, Jeanne has conscientiously served the neighborhood as a Kingfield representative on the 35W Ramp Mitigation Task Force. She has done an extraordinary job at keeping the community up-to-date on the group's, (and MnDOT's), thoughts and actions.

Patty Schultz: Patty joins the board after serving and co-chairing on the KFNA Neighborhood Revitalization Program Steering Committee for the past two years. She hopes that her work at Habitat for the Humanities can assist the KFNA Board with accomplishing some of its affordable housing goals.

Tony Aspholm: A resident of Kingfield for the past 14 years, Tony is the husband of one and the father of four. Tony is interested in the issues of housing and transportation. His hobbies include swimming and cross-country skiing.

Farewell from our KFNA President

Dear neighbors,

I wanted to say good-bye, since I am stepping down after two years as president of the Kingfield Neighborhood Association. I have recently been named editor of the Southwest Journal, and since our paper covers the Kingfield neighborhood, I can't participate in the decision-making anymore.

I'm satisfied and humbled to have been so active in the neighborhood – especially since I originally ran for the board three years ago because I was angry. There was a proposed bus hub where half the buses in South Minneapolis would have congregated just a few blocks from our house. I didn't feel the board had given us proper notice it was coming.

I vowed to run and do a better job communicating with you. If you're on the Kingfield neighborhood email list – now 420 strong! – you've seen one fruit of that frustration. Thanks to our persistence, the bus hub plan was dropped in favor of a cooperative solution to figuring out better bus routes (what we wanted in the first place).

I'm proudest of helping create a positive, mutually respectful board culture. In a volunteer organization, it's essential to battle cynicism and distrust that can so corrode the generous volunteer spirit and torpedo involvement. In the past two years, we have occasionally disagreed on issues, but never stopped assuming the best about each other, and that's a credit to everyone involved.

I'm also proud of creating last year's Kingfield Barn-Raising, where neighbors swarmed one project for a needy neighbor – about 30 of us repainted probably the biggest house in the neighborhood last fall! More profoundly, I'm honored to have facilitated the involvement of so many great neighbors, through the email list, countless door-to-door lit drops, and a lot of phone conversations. Almost nothing you see the neighborhood do is the work of one person – but one person can really improve things by getting the ball rolling.

There have been defeats, too. I'm sad that we couldn't save the two homes next to Ace Hardware that were demolished for a parking lot earlier this year. Because of our appreciation for Ace's community contribution, we voted to recommend city approval of the lot. Afterward, we worked hard to save and move the houses. However, we should have insisted on more time to assure the move before okaying the lot. We didn't have enough time in the end. There were no bad guys here, but I wish I had it to do over again.

I'm leaving the board in great hands – it was a final satisfaction to hear people say at our April annual meeting that they'd never seen so many great candidates! Thank you to everyone, and I'll see you in the Journal or at the next neighborhood meeting! Sincerely.

If you are not a volunteer for the Minneapolis Police Department and would like to become involved in National Night Out, please contact your CCP/SAFE team or the NNO coordinator Lisa Klaphake, 612-673-2812. The City Council has waived the fee for people who register to block off their streets for their NNO events by July 9th. Those who register between July 10th and July 23rd will be charged \$15, and those whose applications are received after the close of business on July 23rd will be denied.

(As in past years, people must register their NNO events using the appropriate forms from the City Clerk's office. Just registering an event with CCP/SAFE will not mean that the street can be legally blocked off. The City Clerk's street closing application form will go out as part of the NNO mailing to volunteers. The number for the City Clerk's office is 612-673-2215.)
